Nursery


Another brilliant week in Nursery!

Reception

As October begins, we are slowly but surely getting into the swing of things in Reception. More and more children are coming into school independently and so after half term, we will be expecting all the children to come through the gate on their own. The Reception gate will close at 8:25am so the children have time to do their morning jobs and be ready to learn at 8:30am.

Parents, thank you for your understanding with this but it is very busy in the mornings with lots of children moving around so we need to ensure all the children are safe in their classroom with their teachers at the start of the day. The sooner the children are in, the sooner they settle and get on with the important job of learning 3

This week we have completed our first independent writing; this was writing our own name without the support from an adult and drawing a portrait of ourselves. Please keep working on this at home. It makes life much easier for your children if they can recognise and write their own name. Encourage them to use a capital letter for the start of their name and lower-case letters for the rest of it and continue to work on holding the pencil correctly. They are loving 'pen disco' which can be found on YouTube which will also give them a tip on how to hold their pencil correctly.

In maths, we have been learning to subitise up to 5. This is when children can recognise quantities without counting them.



Try this at home - Drop a few objects (up to 5) onto the floor. Ask the question 'What do you see?' rather than 'how many?' They may respond - I can see 2 and another 2, that's 4. Or they might say, I can see 2 and 1 and 1, that's 4 altogether. This will support your children with learning to subitise so they understand what 4 actually looks like as an amount of objects

and how 4 can be created rather than just being able to count 1,2,3,4 by rote.

It was lovely to see so many children dressed up for World Animal Day on Wednesday, ask your children what they now know about hedgehogs. They may even sing you a song about them.

Year 1

We have a fun filled 'wild' week in Year 1! The children were immersed in all things animal this week.

The children enjoyed a trip to the zoo on Monday, thank you again to parent helpers for your support. At the zoo the children had the opportunity to walk around and see many different animals. They also spent some time in the zoo classroom taking part in animal classification activities. The children have been looking at how to classify animals that are mammals, reptiles, birds, fish and amphibians. This has supported our topic learning this week. Children would also benefit from consolidation with this at home.

In literacy we have been focusing on verbally recounting our trip to the zoo. This will support our unaided writing next week. While recounting our zoo trip the children have been asked to think about their senses and how they used these around the zoo. The children have been thinking of sentences using the starters 'At the zoo I (saw, heard, smelt, touched)...' Children would benefit from consolidation at home.

In maths this week we have been continuing our learning with numbers to 10. The children have been counting different amounts of objects to 10 and showing different ways to represent a number.

The children have also enjoyed creating some animal print art work this week!

- -Please continue to read every day with your children and record this in your child's homework diary.
- -Please continue to encourage your children to practice their spellings daily.
- -Ensure all belongings brought into school are named.
- -Please do not bring backpacks into class. A lunchbox and bookbag is suitable.
