Dear Parents and Carers,

Head Teacher's Comments

The Key Stage 2 laptops are starting to be rolled-out. Even in these initial days, the feedback on their impact from the children and staff has been incredible. Parents / carers please take some time to discuss with your children what they are doing with their new devices. Please bear in mind, that alongside the children learning, so are our staff; we are getting to grips with the new technologies, on-line resources and opportunities that every child having a laptop presents. How the laptops are being used will, naturally, vary from class to class and year to year, as we develop our skills as adults.

For those who haven't contributed the £10 / term because it's a financial challenge, PLEASE do get in touch with me in confidence. I do not want any child feeling unnecessarily 'different' due to their family finances. Thank you.

Next, we take on the opportunities afforded to us by 100 new iPads in Key Stage 1. In the first instance, these will remain in school.

My particular thanks to Miss Leighton for her diligence in putting these projects together.

I continue to meet with teachers all week, reviewing the progress that your children are making. I have been very impressed by the depth to which my colleagues truly know each child's needs and their current levels of attainment. Of course, the rate of progress and the levels attained by each child varies but what I can say is that every child is making progress on many levels. What we don't talk about is 'ability'. Language such as "X pupil is really low ability" or "the top group or bottom group" or even "the best or the worst" is not helpful and would concern me. Labelling, categorising and ranking children is not helpful. A label such as 'low ability' can stick with a child and remains fixed for many years. Children aren't 'less able' but might need more support and different learning opportunities to others...when we label children as 'low ability' we cap the expectations of what a child can achieve, we set ceilings on their potential and we run the risk of damaging a child's self-esteem and aspirations. At d'Auvergne, we have high expectations for all pupils; we acknowledge that ability is not fixed and actively avoid labelling children.

Reception

Thank you to all who have returned the Mathletics forms. These have now been passed onto Mrs Wheaton, our Maths co-ordinator, who is in the process of creating your child's login. We will distribute these as soon as we receive them.

Your child should now have begun completing their handwriting workbook, (2 units per week). We stress the importance of monitoring your child as they complete this work to ensure that they are forming the letters correctly. It is quite common for children to reverse

some letters at this age, but we would prefer to develop good habits in handwriting from the start. We look forward to collecting in the completed books at half term.

During our Literacy time this week we have been working on improving our story telling. We have spent lots of time thinking about starting our stories in a descriptive way, such as 'Once upon a time', 'One sunny day' or 'On a stormy night'. We have discussed making our stories interesting by describing a problem for our characters and then thought carefully about how the problem might be solved and how our character feels at the end of the story. The children love letting their imaginations run wild and are getting better at making sure their story ideas link together. Have a go a making up your own bedtime stories together, guiding them to think of an interesting beginning, a problem for their character and a solution that helps their story link together.


Maths this week has been all about subtraction. We start with actual objects, then physically take some away, counting how many are left. We use simple Maths story language such as:

First there were 5 frogs.


Then one jumped off.

Now there are 4 left.

We would also use language such as **take away** and **equals**.



One the children have a good understanding of this concept, we can then begin to introduce the subtraction and equals symbols alongside the story.



Have a go at trying some subtraction stories at home over the Bank Holiday. Remember to use actual objects to start off with, then as your child becomes more confident, you can challenge them with picture or verbal stories and even a subtraction number sentence using symbols.

Year 1

This week we thoroughly enjoyed our first trip (!) out to Mont Orgueil castle, the children all behaved beautifully and were a credit to our school - well done!

We have introduced multiplication to the children by looking at equal groups of numbers, being able to count in 2's, 5's and 10's has really helped us with this, please ensure you continue to practice this at home. Next week in maths, we will be starting to look at division using the vocabulary 'sharing equally between'. Please start to use this language with your child at home to help to familiarise them with the concept. You could do this by sharing 9 grapes equally between 3 bowls, sharing 5 biscuits between 2 teddy bears etc.

Our story focus for next week will be 'Rumplestiltskin'. The children are starting to use lots of detail when retelling the story during writing lessons, please remember to ask your child about the stories that we are reading, asking them lots of questions!

Please may we ask that you send your child into school with a **empty milk/juice cartons** (washed out) and empty toilet/kitchen roll tubes no later than Monday 10th May? We will be getting creative and having a go at building our own towers!

Year 6

This week in Year 6, we were overjoyed to welcome back Kirsten from You Matter, in the flesh rather than through TEAMS! She talked to us about 'Boundaries', our bodies and what it means for something to be private and public, she also discussed our right to say 'No' and set our own boundaries and the importance of strongly believing in these. We talked through in groups different scenarios and thought about choices we make using a list of 5 criteria:

- 1) Is it dangerous? (to you or someone / something else?)
- 2) Could you get into trouble if you do this?
- 3) Will it upset or hurt anyone?
- 4) Would your parents or teacher be upset with you if you did this?
- 5) Would it be bad if everyone did this?

If the answer was 'Yes' to one of the questions we know that we 'DON'T DO IT!'. Remember this!

In Maths we have continued on with our journey of measurement and in Writing we are finalising our information leaflets. Later in the week we began to look at the difference between an autobiography and a biography and the features we can spot between the two. In reading, we have read two historical texts featured around Jousting and another centred on Boudicca. Each child has two texts a week set on Cracking Comprehension, it is important that they engage with these as well as the daily texts added on to Google Classroom. Well done to those that have completed these tasks – remember to continue to read out loud and make sure you are correctly pronouncing words.

In school we are thoroughly enjoying using our Laptops for morning work and engaging more with Mathletics and Cracking Comprehension, we are hopeful that these will be able to come home with us soon.

In Maker Space this week we were able to make a pumping system to carry water from one area into another, replicating the heart and we began to generate animations of how the blood flows through the body using skills Mr Livesey taught us earlier in the year on ipads.
