#### **Head Teacher's Comments**

Following the Government of Jersey Press Release I remind you that now, asymptomatic children identified as Direct Contacts will require daily Lateral Flow Tests to be completed and recorded by yourselves for 10 consecutive days. The LFTs are available from school, so please make sure your child has a box if they are identified as a Direct Contact.

May I also re-emphasise that children displaying any of the Covid-19 symptoms will still be required to stay away from school and obtain a PCR test – this guidance has not changed.

### **Mathletics On-Line Global Competition**

Children took part in an on-line global maths challenge last week, for the week. d'Auvergne children did incredibly well and achieved a fantastic 77<sup>th</sup> place IN THE WORLD out of nearly 2000 schools! Our highest scoring pupil was Charlie R from Y3B – well done Charlie and congratulations to all who took part. Thanks to Mrs Wheaton for organising. You should all be very proud of yourselves!

#### **Eisteddfod**

Very many pupils from across the school took part in the verse-speaking section of the Eisteddfod for the first time this week. All of their experiences were incredibly positive, gaining much confidence from public speaking. Standing on a stage, in front of an unknown audience, takes grit and determination – GREAT JOB EVERYONE! We even had section winners, with Layla Rose and Alexandra Marie coming out on top in their categories.

The concept of taking part in such events as the Eisteddfod is something that we shall always promote. It aligns perfectly with one line from our school vision, whereby our curriculum promotes a depth of learning through a range of rich experiences which build cultural capital.

#### **Choir Events**

We are delighted that we now have a 100-strong choir! This is amazing! All will be singing at the Soup Kitchen event in early December, with 30 able to attend Government House to perform for the Lieutenant-Governor Sir Stephen Dalton and Lady Dalton.

#### **Christmas Productions**

We have taken the difficult decision to, again, move our Christmas 'performances' to being streamed on-line. The current Covid-19 guidance means that we are cannot allow large

groups of parents to gather, or children to mix, for longer periods of time. Details about what the streaming will look like will follow in due course but will be spectacular! In the meantime, I shall be sending a confirmatory communication to some parents who have indicated that they do not give permission for their child to be filmed or put on social media. If this remains your position, which we respect, your child will not take part in the filming and we shall cater for them in school whilst this is happening.



#### Year 3

This week, year 3 have been introduced to our new topic called 'Tremors'. The children have created a timeline to show the previous historical events they have already learnt about in order to understand where about in history the tragic disaster of Pompeii took place. Linking into our topic, the children have been planning and writing their own adventure story based on a volcanic eruption using recent footage from the news of the 'La Palma' volcano for inspiration.

This week in maths, we are continuing to focus on subtraction but looking at how we can represent this using the bar model. The Mathletics website is a great resource for the children to use to help consolidate and revisit their learning. Under the 'play tab' (first image below) there are several Matheltics games and apps. The 'Maths A–Z' app (second image below) is an online glossary with great short videos showing how to carry out important maths skills. The children have been shown this in class but please encourage your child to use this fantastic resource at home.





Your child should have brought home a

sheet which contains a reading, writing and maths home learning bookmark. These bookmarks contain many ways in which you can support your child across the subjects helping them progress through year 3.

Over the last few weeks we have been introducing the children to more formal mental maths assessments. It was a shock for them initially, given that they had only five seconds to answer the first ten questions and then ten seconds for the next set. However, we are proud of them all as they are learning to increase their pace in responding. At home please help them with this. On Monday, the children worked with Mr. Livesey in the Maker Space. They learned to use an app called Audacity, to record and monitor soundwaves made from different instruments and elastic bands. We then used this app in our Science investigation to show that we could gather data accurately to find out which instrument had the longest note.

#### Year 5

This week your child may have come home talking about some tests they have completed at school, that is because we have begun our assessments. The children will each complete a PiRA (reading) and PUMA (maths) test, similar to as in Year 4. We will share these results with you when we have our parent, teacher consultations. Please reassure your child that there is nothing to worry about, we can always learn from our mistakes, and in fact making a mistake can be helpful!

In Literacy, we have been building up our class newspaper report, making sure we're including all the key features, such as a headline, by-line, lead and body. Each class has picked their own image to use as a stimulus to write their newspaper report - ask your child what theirs is about - is it the alien found in d'Auvergne Library? Or perhaps the new planet found in the solar system?

In Maths, we have been continuing our multiplication and division chapter and have looked in more depth at factors and multiples, as well as finding out what prime numbers are. Can your child explain what makes prime numbers so special? You can always use this link to help you:
