# **Attendance and Punctuality**

Naturally, we are sensitive to Covid-related absences and record them accordingly. However, I cannot support term-time holidays, and these are recorded as 'Unauthorised'. Every day out of school means the learning cannot be recovered. It is an inconvenience to the class teacher, who has to try to cover previous missed work with the individual who has been out of class; this has an impact on the rest of the class who lose access to the teacher whilst they are supporting the child who has been away. Please, book holidays in holiday time.

The school day starts at **8.15am** (for all classes beyond Nursery). Register is taken at 8.30am, but you should aim for the children to be with us for 8.15am – that should be the target. The time between 8.15am and 8.30am is planned for by the class teachers. It is a settling time for the children and helps them 'gather' themselves for the day ahead. Turning up at 8.30am is having an impact on the start of their day. Please aim to get children here by 8.15am – **it will help raise standards.** 

Rachel and Mrs Fail meet every week to review punctuality and attendance figures. Any concerns are raised with parents to determine how we may help. Occasionally, if necessary, the Education Welfare Service is involved to further support families.

Happy New Year to everyone, we look forward to a great spring term!



# Year 1

Welcome back! We hope you all had a pleasant break.

We have started this term by noticing the change in weather. Now that we are well into winter, we have been looking at how the temperature has got colder, the days are much shorter and the (deciduous) trees are now completely bare! We have also discussed the effect that winter has on some animals, causing them to hibernate or migrate. Finally, we have taken notice of the different clothing we need to wear during the winter months.

In Maths we have spent some time looking at subtraction equations. We have used different strategies to help us solve subtraction problems including subtraction by crossing out and subtraction by counting back. Please see the picture below as an example.



Next week we begin our new topic of Pirates. We will soon be sending home some vocabulary for you to practice with your child which we will meet in our learning. Thank you for sending in shoe boxes or similar for the children's treasure chest art project. Please send these in as soon as possible if you haven't yet done so.

The children have started 2022 with a bang! They have come back focused, ready, and raring to go.

We have started reading our new class text, Roald Dahl's George's Marvellous medicine which we hope will inspire the children to produce some wonderful descriptive writing. Keep working on handwriting at home, we have high expectations in year 2 and the children are all aware of their targets.

In Maths, we have begun our new chapter, recognising multiplication as equal groups. Some of the children in Year 2 already know their 2x, 5x and 10x tables. If they don't, please keep practising these at home. It's important that they are also able to explain their thinking, apply the skills learnt to solve multiplication problems and show these equations in different ways,

e.g. 4 groups of 3 = 12 four threes = 12 3 + 3 + 3 + 3 = 12 4 x 3 = 12

Reminder about PE days - Tuesdays and Wednesdays

Also, please remember to send your child into school with everything they need for the day ahead including water bottle, lunch bag, snack (fruit or veg), coat, book bag and school planner. Please do not allow them to come in with toys, football /pokeman cards or similar, this just causes disagreements.

#### Year 5

Welcome back and Happy New Year!

We have jumped right into our new topic this week, Pharaohs, creating a timeline of events. In Literacy, we are finding out information about the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb by Howard Carter. We have watched archive footage as well as used non-fiction books and websites to help us gather and write notes. We have taken time to consider organising our notes, for example using subheadings, which will then help us write a chronological report. We have also started our new class text, Poppy Pym and the Pharaoh's Curse and are excited to see where this story takes us!

In Maths, we are building on our multiplication and division chapter and are continuing to use our times tables to help us solve divisions, such as dividing by 10, 100 and 1000, as well as dividing 3- and 4-digit numbers by 1-digit numbers. We've used pictorial methods, as well as the expanded formal method using partitioning. It really does help the children if they have quick recall of their multiplication facts up to  $12 \times 12$ , so please continue learning these at home and using TT Rockstars too.

Our PE days this half term will be Wednesday and Friday. We are excited to be able to work with Lauren from Jersey Sport on a Friday to deliver high quality netball coaching.
