In maths we have continued learning about time, durations of time, start and end times....everything to do with time!

Keep practising at home with some word problems e.g. *It 2:35 and we need to be at the cinema for 3:05. How many minutes do we have to get there? The film starts at 3:25 and lasts for 1 and a half hours. What time will the film finish?*

Now that the children know who their Year 3 teacher will be, we've begun writing letters to them, telling our new teachers all about ourselves; what we like learning, what hobbies we enjoy and what we are looking forward to in Year 3. We know for some children (and parents), this will be an anxious time and they may be worried about the challenges of 'harder' work or not being with all their classmates that they've been familiar with for the last few years but this is an opportunity for them to create new friendships and work alongside different children which I'm sure you'll agree is a positive thing. Year 3

This week, year 3 have written some fantastic historical fiction stories, travelling back in time to the Stone Age! The children have worked hard to include many of the writing skills they have learnt this year and we have been particularly impressed with how many of the children have correctly used direct speech and apostrophes within their work as these can be tricky to fully understand. The children will continue to develop their story writing skills, along with learning about direct speech and apostrophes, in year 4.

In reading, we have been continuing with our class text, Stig of the Dump and the children have enjoyed doing some whole class reading. The children have created wanted posters to try and help the police catch the thieves that robbed the house of Barney's grandmother.

Year 4

The Year 4 teachers have now handed over the Newsletter writing to a team of keen reporters. Each week this will continue and you can see the names of our reporters in the sign off below.

Last Friday we went to Elizabeth Causeway to meet with the conservationists at *Jersey Marine Conservation*. We got to look at lots of different marine species such as starfish, lug worms, goby fish, and crabs. Some of us tidied the beach of litter and also did some sketching. It was a brilliant opportunity to learn more about our important coastlines in Jersey.

This week, year 4 have been learning how to code a bubble pop game on scratch so they have ideas to code an underwater game. In PE, we have been training our hockey skills and rounders.

In maths, we were measuring the perimeter of shapes. Perimeter is the total length of the outside of a shape. For our help we used a ruler to measure each side of the shape.

In reading, we had some of our parents watch our reader's theatre. We read some of chapter 1 of *Why The Whales Came* by Michael Morpurgo.

In writing, we have been using a dictionary to find out what 'dilemma' and 'consequence' mean for our Dilemma Stories work. These updates have been written by Xavier, Tadhg, Tristan, and Logan.

Thank you to our parents visiting our classes this week. It has been lovely to welcome you back into d'Auvergne and we are sure you are so proud of the year 4 group just like we are!

All of Year 5 went to Havre des Pas for Swim Safe sessions on Tuesday. What great ambassadors they were for d'Auvergne School, and although they were tired a great time was had by all.

In writing, we have continued to extend our persuasive texts using the different sentence structures to write an introduction to persuade the reader of our point of view. We are beginning to edit our own and others work, discussing ways in which we can improve it and ensuring we have included all the relevant parts.

In maths, we have been learning about position and movement of shapes. Accuracy has been so important as we plot co-ordinates for 2d shapes and then use our knowledge to reflect and translate those shapes.

In art we have looked at and discussed the work of the Spanish artist Joan Miro before recreating our own art in the same style. We have also made decorated and made 3d fish following the Map of

Wonders course. The children also continue to work on WW2 art sketching and painting poppies and well as creating silhouette pictures.

We have also learned how to play petanque with Madame Mann during French. Once we knew the rules it proved a popular and competitve game that we all enjoyed playing.

Spellings are given out every Friday and there are always spare copies should your child mislay them but we have included them so that you know what they need to practise.
