#### Reception

What a lovely week learning about Chinese New Year! We have enjoyed learning how to count to 10 in Cantonese, had a go at writing Chinese numbers, decorated some beautiful golden and red lanterns and spent time in our Chinese Restaurant, taking food orders and practising eating with chopsticks. To say 'Happy New Year' or 'wishing you happiness and prosperity' in Cantonese, we say, "Gong hei fat choy" (恭喜发财)

In maths, we have been matching numerals to five frames and representing numbers in different ways. We have also been learning the names of the week and ordering the days. Our Read Write Inc groups have got off with a bang and the children are now becoming familiar with finding their way to their new group and having a tour of the school in the process. Some children will be coming home with RWI books. These books will have been introduced during their sessions and so they should be 'easy' to read. There are comprehension questions in the back of the books so please work through these at home. Reading can come in all forms; magazines, leaflets, signposts, newspapers, shopping lists..., please don't stick to just the RWI books as these can become a little dry. If your child is still learning the first set of sounds, then work on these at home too please.

We have really enjoyed retelling the familiar story of The Three Little Pigs and the Big Bad Wolf, but this week, we changed the characters to The Three Little Rabbits and the Big Fiery Dragon to fit in with our these of Chinese New Year. We even came up with new ideas to build the houses with different materials and change the ending of the story. Please ask your children about their new stories and what was their favourite part.

After a very wet and windy week, we are hoping for some drier weather, however, we still have children without wellies, waterproofs, and spare clothes in school. We love to learn outside in Reception, so we need these bringing in as soon as possible.

#### Year 1

This week in maths we have been focusing on numbers to 20. We have been using 10's frames and then counting on to different numbers between 10 and 20. We have also been ensuring our 2-digit numbers are written in the right order e.g. 16 not 61.

In Literacy this week we have been writing about the famous pirate Blackbeard! The focus has been on writing in the past tense. The children have learnt about Blackbeard's life as a pirate and produced a piece of writing ensuring their sentences are in the past tense and make sense.

In Topic this week we have been looking at similarities and differences between life 300 years ago when it was the Golden Age of Piracy and life now. Children would benefit from consolidation of past and present, old and modern, then and now at home.

On 30<sup>th</sup> January we are going on a trip to the Maritime Museum. This trip will be in the afternoon. If you are available to help out, please let your child's class teacher know. If you have any concerns about your child coming along on this trip, please inform your child's class teacher.

#### Year 2

This has been our final week in Y2 working on multiplying by 2,5 and 10. However, the children will still be applying these skills in other areas of their maths. It is really important that they continue to practice counting in 2s, 5s and 10s so that they become fluent with this. They also need to be fluent with doubling.

We have been creative in our English lessons this week, designing our own islands to help us plan our writing based on "We are going on a Bear Hunt." We have applied our knowledge of adjectives and onomatopoeia when deciding on the obstacles that will be in our poem.

In science, we have been looking at animals and their offspring and monitoring the progress of the beans that we have recently planted. Also, we have been exploring bulbs and how comparing their growth to the way in which seeds grow.

We have been practicing our maths skills in computing by collecting data in the form of tables and pictograms and answering questions about how useful pictograms are.


### Year 5

#### Year 6

This week, children have learned more about the circulatory system and have made their own anatomical diagram of it along with the technical names for each part. We have made our own 'blood' using food ingredients to show the distribution of plasma, red blood cells, and white blood cells.

In Writing, we have been assessing the quality of newspaper articles. Children should be able to create an alliterative headline from an image, and should be able to explain the features of a newspaper or article.

In Maths, we have continued long division but have progressed to using 2-digit divisors. Children should be able to explain that if 13 doesn't fit into the first digit, we check if 13 can fit into the next *two* digits.

In Reading, we have enjoyed Pig Heart Boy and are on Chapter 5. We have inferred why characters think certain things and using evidence to prove inference.

#### Home Learning WB Monday 23rd January

Reading: Daily for 20 minutes. Please remind your child to record this in their homework diary.

**Spelling:** This week's spellings featuring mixed suffixes: beginning, admittance, stoppable, permitting, preferred, regrettable, wettest, forgotten, funny, referring, regretted, forbidden.

Maths: Maths Tutor and TT Rockstars.

**KS2 Assessment texts:** Children in each class are given a reading text for some days during the week (each Year 6 class may be at a different 'place' with this). Children should go on google classroom each day and comment on their teacher's post about the text. Children should be practising their best writing skills with their typing including the use of punctuation, full sentences, correct grammar, and extending their own writing. Children can use the 'magpie words' activity on google classroom to structure their definitions of unfamiliar words.
