Head Teacher's Comments

It is great to be back in school – a sense of normality has nearly returned!

The Year 6 pupils were a credit to themselves and their families last week in England. Such a lovely group of children! They worked well in teams, overcame personal challenges, and were great company. Year 5 pupils / families will shortly be informed of the details of next summer's off-Island residential – we hope everyone will be keen to attend!

In the run-up to half-term, myself and senior colleagues are interviewing several UK candidates for teaching roles at d'Auvergne. Following these processes, we shall be able to start induction / transition procedures for children to new classes at the end of June. However, we shall be welcoming a few new members of the staff team into school after half-term, to smooth transition to Jersey / to d'Auvergne.

The very significant challenge of recruiting to schools in Jersey cannot be underestimated. We are doing our very best, against the odds, to be fully staffed for September. We know this is true in other industries but for schools, this is critical; we must have a teacher in front of a class.

You will recall that this year we have been piloting a 15-minute extension to the school day. Following feedback from colleagues, we shall extend this model into next year. This means that the day will continue to end at 3pm for school, and 2.45pm for Nursery. We shall review this at Easter 2024, as it is a non-contractual offer from the staff team. I sincerely thank them for their commitment to our children.

This means, as a result of d'Auvergne staff, your children are getting an extra 2 weeks of school each year. With this in mind, **PLEASE MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO MAKE SURE THEY ARE IN SCHOOL ON TIME AND DO NOT TAKE TIME OFF FOR HOLIDAYS DURING THE TERM.** We are doing everything we can to raise standards, we need every family's help too.

Year 1

It was lovely to see lots of smiling faces on Wednesday morning as we welcomed the children back after our extended weekend. We have been chatting about the Coronation, and in particular the signs and symbols associated with the event. In Literacy, we are preparing for our unaided write next week, instructional writing. We are looking at the features of this genre and how it differs from other types of writing we have done previously.

In maths we continue to work on solving word problems. This area of maths can be quite tricky; often it is not the maths children find difficult but working out which operation to use in their number sentences. All children would benefit from some consolidation at home. Challenge your child to complete a 2-step word problem!

In Science we are working on Food and Framing. We would love to see any pictures of what you are growing at home. We have had interesting discussions as to where the children think our food comes from!

Year 2

Although this has been a very short week in school, we have still managed to pack in a lot of learning.

In maths, the children have become more confident to describe and recognise 3D shapes. If you have any interesting packaging at home that your child can identify as a cylinder, cone, cube, cuboid, prism, or pyramid, please send it in so we can display it. Next week, we

will begin a unit on money. The outcomes we are aiming for are for the children to be able to recognise and use symbols for pounds (£) and pence (p), to be able to combine amounts to make a particular value and to find different combinations of coins that equal the same amounts of money.

Needless to say, please empty those jars and pockets at home of all your loose change so that your child becomes familiar with handling and sorting coins. Once they can identify the value of each coin, counting a pile of coins is always a fun activity. As you know, we have been learning X2, X5,X10 times tables, so counting piles of 2p, 5p and 10p coins, would be a fantastic start. Thank you for your support.

All three classes will be meeting Erin from the National Trust on Tuesday afternoon to plant a pollinator patch in the school grounds. Hopefully this will bloom with poppies, red campion, ox eyed daisies, cornflowers and dandelions over the summer and attract wildlife to our wonderful garden area.

Staying on the subject of plants, each class is off on a visit to the Eric Young Orchid Foundation in Trinity next week. We desperately need parent helpers to ensure that our adult to child ratios is correct.



We have spent this week really encouraging the children to tell the time using an analogue clock but writing the answer digitally. They have learned to use the vocabulary 'to' or 'past' the hour as well as using AM and PM. Please practise as much as you can at home. Here are some clocks with times on, to give you an example of what we have been doing...



In science, we have created Venn diagrams to help organise animals into groups according to what they eat. Which of these animals are the Herbivore, Carnivore and Omnivore? Can the children create a food chain for each animal too?



Next week our spelling pattern will be using the **suffix -sion**. Words such as **decision**, **collision** and **television** will be included and the children will be writing these in sentences on Monday morning.

We have the first full week in a while next week - so plenty of rest this weekend and we look forward to heading to the Maker Space on Monday with Mr. Livesey.

Year 4

The children in Year Four have been up to lots of activities this week.

In Science we have been conducting experiments looking at changes of states and how fast ice cubes can melt in different conditions. This has led nicely into a writing activity where the children have written up and produced bar graphs showing their results and why this was the case.

In Maths, we have begun our new Topic: Geometry and are learning all about comparing different angles including, acute, right and obtuse angles. Please remind the children to use their vocabulary sheets which were handed out last week to help with key vocabulary and terminology for this area in Maths.

The children are making superb progress in their swimming lessons and are learning new techniques such as straddle jumping, front crawl and butterfly stroke! We will continue our lessons until the end of this half term and thank you again to parent helpers.

We had a wonderful time at the Maritime museum on Thursday, learning about seashells, boats and sand dunes! Thank you again to our wonderful parent helpers for your support with this to allow the children to fully immerse themselves in our Topic this term.

Year 5

This week in writing we assessed the effectiveness of others' writing by editing and improving a diary entry. We used thesauruses to up level words and made the passage longer by including more detail and a range of sentence types.

In maths, we have continued our decimal chapter, learning how to add and subtract decimals up to thousandths and including missing numbers for example:

0.461 + *** = 1
2 - 0.34 =
```

In PE, we have continued our dance lessons by learning news steps to add into our dance sequence including some partner work.

In topic, we have started learning and discussing the holocaust and how this was one of the most terrible events in human history. Please do speak to your child about this as it can be quite upsetting. As we have said to the children, it is important for us to teach this so that something so tragic doesn't happen again.

In RE, we have been discussing our worldviews and how we all look at the world differently. We decided our worldview is like putting on a pair of sunglasses, just as sunglasses colour everything we see, our worldview affects our interpretation of everything we learn and experience. We all created a posted of how we view our world.

Although it has been a short week, we have still completed lots of learning. Please remember to keep reading and signing the home planners.
