Thank you for the huge support during **Sports Day**; the children were all active, energetic and took part with pride – great job!



We have now come to the end of the spelling patterns that the children have to learn in Year 3 and we are going to focus on a type of word known as a 'homophone'. Homophones are words that have the same sound but are spelt differently and have a different meaning. Here are this week's homophones...

This week we have had another busy week in Year Four!

In English, we have been writing re-counts about our recent trips, together with completing our simile and metaphor poems!

In Science this week, we have started our work on Electricity, which the children thoroughly enjoyed and we will continue with this until the end of term. We also had a brilliant visit from the Jersey fire and rescue team who came to visit d'Auvergne on Tuesday to teach the children about being safe and what to do in an emergency. We even heard the sirens as the fire truck left at lunchtime!

We have been practising our trumpet and clarinet pieces ready for our upcoming concert on Tuesday 4th July. We very much look forward to seeing all those who can attend next week, the children have worked very hard on their performances.

Year 5

Our Sports Day on Thursday was a huge success! Despite the original forecast, the weather remained fair and a great time was had by all. Well done to all the children who took part.

In maths, we have been looking and shapes and how we can move them on a grid. We have been using 3 main words to describe how we have moved the shapes (translation, reflection and rotation), can your child describe what these all mean and show you an example? When the children have moved their shapes, they were using coordinates to state the new position of the shape on the grid.

In writing, we have continued to look at persuasive writing, recapping a couple of the writing techniques we have previously looked at: using repeated questions for effect and using relative clauses within our writing. We are working towards our final independent writes of Year 5 and this will be a great opportunity for the children to show off the writing skills they have been learning this year. Please talk to your child about the different techniques we have learned to keep these fresh in their heads.

After the success of our first activity day at Haute Vallee earlier in the year, we will be attending Haute Vallee for a similar morning on Tuesday (4th July). We will be walking there and back, returning to school for lunch (so please ensure your child comes prepared to walk in whatever the weather) and they will be experiencing a couple of different lessons to their last visit. The children thoroughly enjoyed this event last time and we are confident this will be just as valuable. To reiterate from the last visit, it does not matter what secondary school your child is looking to attend, all Year 5 children are welcome and have been asked to attend.

Year 6

We hope you enjoyed d'Auvergne's Family Fun Day last Sunday. Our year 6's excellently hosted and entertained each stall, helping to raise money for the PTA. We are so grateful for our year 6 helpers who gave up their time - THANK YOU!

In Writing, children have been continuing with diary writing focusing on coordinating and subordinating conjunctions. We are familiar with these words to link clauses – words like **because**, **but**, **so**, **or** are coordinating conjunctions (because they link the next clause/part of the sentence) and words like **although**, **however**, **until** are subordinating conjunctions which can support writing in a more unique style.

For Reading we have enjoyed our workshop with Alex Mourant. We have created mesmerising portals; travelled through the 'gump' in a collaborative, sensory art experience; designed our quirky creatures and came out of the secret cove at Plemont to act as our creatures. What an *amazing* experience we have all had! The children thoroughly enjoyed this workshop, based on our text - The Secret of Platform 13. It has been a maturing experience, creating living art pieces which are not always sketched on paper but instead occupy physical space and are performed with movements. A huge well done to the positive attitudes of our pupils who have engaged so well, and a massive thank you to Alex Mourant!

6AW will be enjoying this workshop on Monday and Tuesday next week. Transition.

In Maths, we have continued to learn about volume of 3D shapes and have now moved on to angles, identifying missing angles on a straight line (which add up to 180 degrees).
