Reception

This week Reception have been busy looking at money! We have looked at what coins we have, their colour, shape and value. We looked at which coins have more value than others, how we could make an amount less than 10 pence and how this could be done by using different coins (5p + 5p or 2p + 2p + 2p + 2p + 2p).

At home and if you *miraculously* have coins to play with, please can you encourage your child to pay with coins for something whether in a shop or pretend at home. This not only introduces them to money, the recognition of coins and their value but also reinforces their number knowledge for example 5 + 5 makes 10 so I know that 5p + 5p makes 10p. Remind the children we can only make an amount using the coins we have as we do not have 7p coins! Happy shopping.

We have continued to look closely at the detail in the picture book Flotsam and have created our very own detailed drawings, recognising the concentration and patience it takes to go that extra mile when

drawing. To do this, the children looked closely at their own eyes with a mirror, spotting that they are not just blue, green or brown but how they have a range of colours, lines and spots.



Finally, can we just take this opportunity to say a BIG thank you to you all for your continued support throughout the year, it has been a whirlwind adventure and one that we hope your child has thoroughly enjoyed just as much as us! Have an amazing summer and we can't wait to see you shine in Year one.

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Year 1

Year I have had a very busy week! In Literacy the children have been independently writing their own stories inspired by the story 'Supertato!' This is something the children have really enjoyed. They have thought of their own characters and used some fantastic adjectives to describe them. The children then thought of their own problem to add into their story. Evil Pea has been up to mischief! Finally, the children have come up with some creative endings about how Supertato saved the day!

In Maths we have been looking at money. The children have been recognising both British coins and notes. We have been looking at the value of the coins and notes and working out which note, and coin is the most or least amount of money.

We have been listening to and familiarising ourselves with the story of Jesus and Feeding the Five Thousand this week. The children have discussed the story, the message that the story gives and what a miracle is. The children then drew a scene from the story and described what was happening.

Year 2

This week, Year 2 have continued to learn to tell the time in our maths lessons. As you can imagine, this is a challenge with a class of 26 children! We would therefore ask if you could support your child grasp this life skill with regular practise over the summer holidays. It is important that they learn to tell the time on an analogue clock (one with a minute and hour hand) as well as on a digital clock.

As we near the end of the academic year, we have been reviewing the spellings that the children have been bringing home each week to ensure that they have retained them. We will continue with this review until the bitter end!

We would ask for you to send in a carrier bag on Monday so that we can begin to collate and pack away books and belongings for your child to bring home. At d'Auvergne, we recognise that learning is a continuous journey, so we will be sending Year 2 curriculum books to the next teacher in Year3. In September on their return to school, the children will simply turn the next page to continue their learning journey. These books, when complete, will make their way home too.

Throughout this last term, we have seen the children blossom and grow in confidence. We rightly expect so much of them. When we say goodbye to them at the end of the day and hand them over to you, we are able to see that they are still so young! It is amazing the skills and knowledge that 6- and 7-year-olds are able to master.

They are certainly ready for Year 3 but are ours for one more week to enjoy!

Year 3

What an amazing start to the week in the Maker Space, continuing our science learning about light. The children started to design and make their puppets. Next week, we will finish the puppets and get performing. We are so looking forward to the shows!

At La Hougue Bie, we were so proud of the children for listening well to Charlie, who told us the tale of how La Hougue Bie was made – in Jerriais and again in English. We hope the children have shared this tale with you? It involved a fire breathing dragon, an evil slave and the fabulous Lord Hanby! We were able to chat with Helen the historian, who taught us that it took about fifty hours to smooth and polish a flint stone! Finally, we all had to bend down and clamber along the passage under the mound. It was cold, dark and wet inside so we had to go in small groups. The cap stones were ENORMOUS!

It really was a fabulous way to end our topic and Year 3.

Year 5

This week has been a busy one in Year 5.

On Monday, we attended 'Speak Up, Speak Out' hosted at the Radisson Hotel. We watched some fantastic speeches delivered by Year 6 children from across the island on a range of important topics. This linked in well with our oracy agenda and what we have been practising in our learning. We are looking forward to having the opportunity to work towards this next year.

On Tuesday afternoon, we visited Highlands College for 'Safety In Action'. The children went round in groups to learn more about road, kitchen, beach, play and water safety, as well as First Aid. This was an incredibly valuable afternoon which was enjoyed by all!

In Writing, we have written our class persuasive text and planned and written our independent persuasive texts. In Maths, we have started on Area and Perimeter. The children can apply their knowledge of addition and multiplication within this chapter.

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Year 6

We are increasingly busy in class, practising our leaver's assembly speeches and performances. Children are so excited for the assembly, and we are looking forward to seeing you all there! The assembly is from 9:30-10:30 but we must be strict with time, so please feel free to arrive slightly earlier in preparation.

In Writing, we are writing our diary about the England trip. Children are putting together all the facts they can remember, and they are writing with natural flow. It has been fantastic to see how the children easily use a variety of punctuation and grammatical features in their writing, after working on these skills for almost a year.

In Maths, children have been plotting coordinates, expressing coordinates, and translating shapes across a four-quadrant grid. Some of this is tricky work - especially showing our grids with accuracy!
