
PTA

Year Group Updates

Futures 1

This week we have been using our seeds to make bird feeders. The children have engaged in a variety of fine motor experiences, mixing, sprinkling and pressing the seeds into lard and rolling them to make balls. Once they had completely hardened we threaded some string through them and hung them up on trees outside our classroom. We hope they will attract a few birds over the coming weeks.

We have also been finding out where seeds come from, allowing the children to explore a range of different fruits and vegetables. The children have used their hands, scoops, spoons and tweezers to find and pick out all different sizes and shapes of seeds, helping them to understand the seed life cycle.

We have also used some of the larger bean seeds to help us practice our counting using 1-1 correspondence. It has helped by being able to place the beans in a line or on a grid (5 frame) so that they can be counted more easily.

Futures 2

In Futures 2 we have been very busy this week, literally world building! We have made and named our very own planet. Next week we hope to populate it with an array of wonderful creatures and then add this to our profile of our planet. To infinity and beyond!

Closer to home, we went on a sensory walk-about by creating 'moon rocks' and playing on the moon's surface. One particularly insightful question was, 'Why does the moon change shape?' which led to a discussion about the giant concepts of orbits and the moon reflecting light.

In maths we continue to look at measuring length- some children choosing to use blocks, others string and some even being able to read the values on a ruler. And, our learning friends continue to join us for Forest School (Monday), Challenge Wednesday and Gaming Thursday - our focus this week being 'facing a challenge and completing a task'.

Reception

What an exciting start to our week as we headed out on a minibeast hunt around the school grounds! The children were equipped with clipboards and minibeast checklists, magnifying glasses, and their quiet voices and tiptoeing feet, as we explored the planters around the playground, the polytunnel and the meadow. We found snails, slugs, worms, woodlice, ants, caterpillars, and spiders. Some children said they even spotted a dragonfly!! (Not sure how true that was.)

Once we returned to the classroom, we spent time discussing with our talk partners describing how the different minibeasts move. We used these adjectives to write our sentences e.g. I saw a wiggly worm. I found a slimy slug. The children then used their skills from Read Write Inc to sound out these words and phrases for their own independent writing.

We were so excited to welcome some new visitors to our classrooms this week. Both Miss Shurey's and Mrs Lutkin-Clarke's class have some baby caterpillars that we need to take care of. They have been eating lots and lots of food, just like the Hungry Caterpillar and are now quite big. We hope they will turn into chrysalis' soon so we can watch them metamorphosis into 'Painted Lady' butterflies. Please ask your children about them and see what they can tell you.

A polite reminder, please can you ensure that your children come into school with a water bottle. Some children are regularly turning up without one and although we do have spare cups for the odd occasion, it's a long day to go without a drink.

Also, the school closes its doors at 3pm so if you choose to play outside after school, particularly as the weather improves, you or your child will not be able to re-enter the building to use the toilets. Our school is used by many after school clubs, and we need to keep the doors locked for safeguarding.

Year 1

We have had a lovely week of learning in Year 1. The children really enjoyed welcoming parents into class on Tuesday and Wednesday morning and they were very happy to share their Read Write Inc learning with you. Thank you to all parents that attended and supported these sessions.

In Literacy this week, we have continued our learning on Poetry. The children recapped on rhyming words and poems with rhymes in them. We they looked at acrostic poems. Children learnt about what acrostic poems are and how to write one. As a class we wrote an acrostic poem. The children then started to plan their own acrostic poems using words that are linked to our Pirate topic.

In maths this week we have been looking at subtracting numbers between 20. The children have been using number bonds to support this. They have used number bonds to split teen numbers into 10's and 1's and then taking away from the 10. E.g.

In RE we have been looking at the story of Creation told in the Tanakah (the Hebrew bible). The children have created their own storyboards to retell the Creation story. We then learnt about how Jewish people celebrate Shabbat. We spoke about how this starts on a Friday evening and ends on a Saturday. They celebrate by having a family meal, sharing a special bread and lighting their candles.

In Art, the children have continued to create their pirate ships. They have been busy sawing, drilling and painting sails.

Reminders:

- -On 26th March Year I will be having a Pirate Day! Children are welcome to come in dressed as a pirate. We will also be visiting the Maritime Museum on this morning to learn even more about pirates and Jersey's pirate history. Thank you to the parents who have offered their support with this trip.
- -Please continue to read with your child every day and record this in their diaries.
- -Please encourage your child to practice their spellings every day.
- -Please ensure that all children's belongings are named and that they understand that their property is their responsibility.

Year 2

What a wonderful and wholesome week in Year 2! From welcoming our new arrivals into the world, to creating our own pictographs.

I am sure your excited children have told you all about our new arrivals in both classes. This week we welcomed 6 fluffy chicks in both 2H and 2S. It was lovely to sit with the children and watch the chicks pop out their eggs into the world. The children have really taken to the role of caring for the chicks, feeding them and ensuring they have water. The children produced some beautiful writing in their science books to describe what they observed on hatching day. They used their skills of conjunctions, expanded noun phrases and time adverbials that we focused on last term in writing.





In maths, we have been looking at pictograms. The children used their oracy skills to ask their peers about their eye colours, putting these results into a tally chart. The children then made this into a pictograph, using their ruler skills from our previous topic. The children worked hard with their presentation and the outcome of this looks great!

We have been looking at the Easter story in RE and sequencing these events. We worked in groups to discuss what we could see at each stage and will be making comic strips to accompany this.

Please can we ask that children **do not bring Pokémon cards to school**. There have been several incidents with these the past few weeks, and we would no longer like them to be brought in. These will be confiscated and handed back to parents if they are seen in school.

We look forward to welcoming parents into our lessons next week and wish you a wonderful weekend!

Year 3

What a lovely week we have had in Year 3!

Thank you to the parents who joined in class on Tuesday and Wednesday. We enjoyed having you in and hope that you were able to see what we are learning and how we are developing the children's

oracy and reading skills! Hopefully, we will be able to invite you in again soon so that you can see how we learn in other subjects.

Speaking of reading, we are really putting some energy into using Bugclub to support the children with their reading and would be grateful if you could support us with this at home. We have allocated the children new books and gone through how they earn points through taking quizzes. We look forward to seeing the children's progr3ess with this, happy reading!!

In writing we continue to focus on learning the skills that will help us to write our own non-chronological report about volcanoes. This week we have spent time looking at fronted adverbial, nouns and pronouns and continue to work on our use of different conjunctions (ask your children about FANBOYS and ISAWAWBUB) Next week we will begin writing our own reports!!

In maths we have been deepening our thinking about multiplication and division, whilst continuing to work on our place value knowledge. We have been learning how to do long division, using HMS bring down to help us remember the process. It has been challenging for us to grasp and we continue to practise the skills. One thing we would say helps massively is having rapid recall of multiplication and division facts for the 2,3,4,5,8 and 10 times table. Please, please, please practise these at home as much as possible, using TTRS to support.

We have welcomed in members of the Baptist Church this week so that we can 'Grill a Christian' this has certainly helped the children with their RE topic. Additionally, we would like to say a big thank you to Nicola Benge who has visited us for the last 4 weeks to support us with our PSHE and wellbeing curriculum.

We have been working on thinking like scientists this week whilst investigating the effect of different suncreams on UV beads. It was really interesting to see what the different factors did to the colour of the beads and how this relates to how we can care for our own skin in the sun.

Finally, this is the last call for any pick and mix homework relating to volcanoes as we will be displaying these for you to come and see after school before the end of term. We have been really impressed by the quality and effort that has gone into the projects and thank you for the time you have taken to work on these with your children, it really will be part of the learning that they will remember.

We have a busy week coming up with lots of opportunity for the children to work on their oracy skills throughout our learning, but especially as we prepare the poem 'Daffodils' to perform to the rest of the school.
