# **PTA**



Please have a conversation with your children about what superpowers people have, including superpowers of kindness, generosity and helping others. All the children have had an opportunity to go on a walk around the school to see if we have any Superheroes in d'Auvergne. We certainly found a few! Ask your children who they spotted. Bonnie, Mr Cooper's dog was certainly a favourite.

We also had a visit from our very own Superhero, Mr Coyne the Caretaker and he came to talk to us about all the jobs he does around d'Auvergne to keep us safe and keep our building safe. He even brought along the lollipop used for helping children to cross the road. This was a job Mr Coyne used to do before we had the zebra crossing installed. We practised crossing the road safely remembering to stop, look and listen, making sure we are always safe.



The children then made their own road safety posters to tell other children how to keep themselves safe when crossing the road.



Our new topic has sparked lots of exciting conversations about what the children would like to be when they become grown-ups. We're sure they'll be having a chat with you about this too.

#### Year 1

It was lovely to see all the children back to school and ready for learning in their last term in Year 1.

In Literacy, we have made predictions based on our class text, Handa's Surprise, and we are working hard to include elements of our Oracy agenda. Please ask your children how they can show they are listening? How do we 'nest'? What is a 'traverse'?

In Maths, we continue to work on Numbers to 40. This includes place value; why is 36 more than 25? How do we know? How can we prove this? Ask your child to consider what each digit is worth.

This week, we have taken part in a whole school 'environmental awareness' afternoon. We discussed what 'the environment' means to us, and how we can all play a role in safeguarding our environment for the future, with a particular focus on the use of wind farms; take some time to talk about this issue with your child, as it is soon to be debated by Government of Jersey.

We will soon be sending home logins for 'Spelling Shed'. This forms part of our Home Learning offer and children can access this excellent resource at home.

Please ensure everything that comes into school is named, so we can reunite lost items with their owners; we would stress that it is the responsibility of the children to keep track of their own property, particularly considering we are gearing up for Year 2.

#### Year 3

Welcome back and to the third and final term in Year 3!

We hope you all had a lovely Easter break and that you are ready for the learning in the weeks ahead!

This term our focus will be mainly around our history topic, Stone Age to Iron Age. We are going to be come historians and do much detective work using images artefacts to help us to consider what life was like for Stone Age man, what we can learn from what archaeologists have discovered at sites such as Skara Brae and Stone Age. The children will also experience what the Stone Age might have been like in Jersey with a trip to La Hougue Bie where they will be able to see a long house that was made using the techniques from Stone Age times. AND if that wasn't enough they will also be using the oracy skills to convince us and each other about the best invention from the Iron Age!

We were very impressed by the effort that went into the Pick and Mix home learning projects last term, so we thought we would launch this again just before May Half Term. So, keep an eye out for all things Stone, Bronze and Iron Age.

Our reading also links to our history as we are reading the book, The Stolen Spear by Saviour Pirotta. It is an adventure story about a boy called Wolf, who goes in search of his villages sacred spear which has been stolen. We are hoping that the children will pick up skills along our reading journey that they can use in the own adverbture stories next half term.

Writing this term is based on the text, How To Wash A Woolly Mammoth! This is a fun introduction on how to write detailed instructions using some of the skills we have been learning such as fronted adverbials, conjunctions and prepositions.

Our maths learning has moved on and we are exploring fractions over the next few weeks. The children will be learning about tenths, how to add and subtract fractions, equivalent fractions and how to find a fraction of a number. Please, please, please continue to support us in developing your children's times tables knowledge as this will help them with fractions! TTRS is a great help!

Spellings will continue to come home in the children's homework planner, but they will also be available on the Spelling Shed which can be accessed from the school's website. The children will have been taught how to find and use it. It is additional but a fun way for the children to explore the spelling rule we are working on.

Bugclub is also something that the children need to continue to access, there are plenty of books for the children to access and most can be listened to. The more opportunities they have to read the more they can practice their decoding skills and become more fluent and that improves their understanding of what they read independently.

And finally, just to remind you that our PE days for the Summer Term are Monday with Rob and Friday with tennis coaches from the Caesarean Tennis Club!

We look forward to working with you to support your children in being the best learners they can be!
