

Year 1

On Tuesday, we performed our Farm poem to the rest of the school and the children did a great job, well done!

Our Sports Day on Thursday was a huge success! Well done to all of the children for taking part.

In Maths, we learned about equal groups. The children used the following sentence stems to discuss the groupings. We grouped counters in groups and then in rows.

- There are ___ in each group.
- There are ___ groups.

We also introduced the children to the basics of multiplication \rightarrow if 3 groups of 2 = 6, we can also write this as $3 \times 2 = 6$.

In Writing, we continued our work on Supertato. By the end of next week, the children will have written their last Independent Write, in the style of the Supertato story. We will use the areas of setting, character, problem and solution to help plan the children's stories.

Year 2

Hello parents,

We can not believe that we only have one more week with all the lovely children we have taught this year! All the children have been amazing and they should be very proud of themselves in what they have achieved this year. They will be very missed but we wish them all good luck as they head in to Year 3!

This week we have been busy in all our subjects. Making sure we have consolidated what we have learnt and putting it into our final Independent writes of the year.

The children have all been able to show how well they can proof read their writing and then edit it to make it even better.

In Science we identified that some materials can change shape by squashing, bending, stretching and twisting, and others can't. Working in small groups we investigated using different objects and recorded the information we found out. This was a very eventful lesson with some great ideas on why some materials can't change back even if we blow on them!

In Literacy we have been learning how to use Contracted apostrophes combine two words into one shorter word, using an apostrophe to replace missing letters. For example, "do" and "not" become "don't". The apostrophe acts as a placeholder for the missing letters. How to use apostrophes in contractions - BBC Bitesize

In Maths we have started a new unit Volume, the children have been choosing and using which units they need to estimate and measure capacity (litres/ml) to the nearest unit. By comparing the volume and capacity in the beakers and recording them using:



All the children took part in our final Poetry performance that had an added addition to it, where the children had learnt the sign language to go with the words that they spoke clearly and with great enthusiasm, Well done Year 2!

The children really enjoyed there sports day and all did amazing, great team spirit and showed fantastic encouragement to one another.

Please can your child bring a named carrier bag in to school next week as we will be sending home some finished books.

Year 3

It has been a busy couple of weeks in Year 3!

In science, we have been exploring animals including humans. As part of this, we have explored the difference between vertebrates and invertebrates as well as looking at different habitats and food chains. We had a look at the BBC bitesize website and practised identifying the different stages of food chains <u>Year 3 Science – BBC Bitesize</u>. We then moved on to looking at how muscles work <u>How do your muscles work? – KS2 Science curriculum – BBC Bitesize</u>. and why our skeletons are important to us <u>What does your skeleton do? – KS2 Science curriculum – BBC Bitesize</u>.

In reading we have finished reading the Stolen Spear and have been enjoying the next adventure, The Whispering Stones. We will probably get to the end of this adventure but there are two more stories in the series; The Mysterious Island and The Wolfsong. If your children enjoy stories based on real history these are great books and there are others too! Historical Fiction — stories are forever

In writing we have started to explored the book Stone Age Boy and have been using in as a starting point to our own writing, which is based on a boy from modern times meeting a stone age girl and going on an adventure together. Our final piece of writing in Year 3 will be a diary entry based on this.

Our maths has been all about shape and perimeter. We have done lots of exploration around this and have been using our multiplication and division facts successfully to work out the perimeter of regular and irregular shapes. What is the perimeter of a 2D shape? – BBC Bitesize.

And finally, our highlights of this week have been performing our Stone Age Boy poem to the rest of the school and listening to the poems that have been learned and performed by other classes. Some of us really liked the Year 6 poem and want to learn it! We also enjoyed being involved in Sport Day on Friday. We are always impressed with the sporting attitude displayed and the encouragement that the children give their class peers as well as those in the houses.

Next week... we will be sending home some of the children's completed books which we are sure they would love to share with you. In preparation for this, please could they be given a plastic bag so that they have something to bring them home in.
