
Reception

Busy, Busy, Busy in Reception!

This week, the children have been fully immersed in the story *Pumpkin Soup* by Helen Cooper. They loved exploring real pumpkins—peeking inside to see the seeds and pulp—and discussing the pumpkin's life cycle. How does a pumpkin grow? What does it look like at each stage? Be sure to ask your child whether they think a pumpkin is a fruit or a vegetable! The fun didn't stop there. The children enjoyed making "pumpkin soup" in the mud kitchen, acting out the story with props (including some fantastic masks!), and carefully creating observational drawings of pumpkins using chalk pastels and crayons.

A big thank you to everyone who attended our first Reception Parent Pop-In. It was wonderful to see so many of you! We understand it can feel a bit overwhelming at first, but rest assured, just minutes after you left, the children were happily back to their activities, smiling and engaged.

Reminder: Our library day is on Wednesday each week. Please send book bags with your child so they can exchange their books and bring a new one home to share with you. Looking ahead to next week, we will be assessing the children's sounds and encouraging them to try their first independent writing task—drawing a self-portrait and writing their name. You can help at home by practicing the "nip, flip, grip" pencil hold to support their writing skills.



Also, *Super Smiles* will be visiting us next week. This is a familiar program for our nursery children. New parents should have received a letter with information and a permission slip—please complete and return it to school.

Year 2

Firstly, thank you to all the parents who came in on Wednesday morning to watch and join in with our arithmetic, we hope you enjoyed it! It was lovely to see so many of you.

We have had a great week of learning in Year 2!

This week in Literacy, the children have been working hard on their independent writing. They wrote diary entries from the perspective of Samuel Pepys experiencing the Great Fire of London, using their knowledge of the event to bring their writing to life. The children demonstrated great imagination as they described the fire, and we were very impressed with the quality of their work.

In Maths, we have continued developing our addition skills using both the column method and the part-part-whole model. This week, we progressed to adding numbers greater than 10, and the children showed growing confidence in carrying numbers and understanding place value.

As part of our ongoing topic on the Great Fire of London, the children were thrilled to receive a very special visit from none other than Samuel Pepys himself! They had the opportunity to ask him the questions they had prepared and thoroughly enjoyed hearing his stories and insights about the fire. It was a fantastic way to bring history to life, and the children were buzzing with excitement after the session.

In Science, we have been investigating how different materials change shape temporarily or permanently. The children tested a variety of objects and materials, discussing which could bend, stretch, or squash—and which could not. One of the most interesting discoveries was that glass does not change shape easily unless it is heated, which the children seemed to enjoy learning about!

Every Friday, the children do their weekly arithmetic assessment. These will be sent home every week so that the children can be supported with any questions that were incorrect at home. The purpose of the arithmetic assessments is to develop fluency throughout the year. The children are not expected to be getting all of the questions correct at this time.

Reminders:

- -Please continue to provide a water bottle and healthy **fruit or veg** snack for your child daily. Snacks and water bottles should be bought up to class every morning. Only lunch foods should be left on the trolleys outside.
- -Please continue to encourage your child to read and practice spellings daily. This should be recorded in their homework diary.

-Please ensure that your child comes to school with a coat. We do still try to get outside, even if it is raining.

Year 4

As explained, our arithmetic agenda is crucial to attainment in maths, so please do look at the tests hat come home on a Friday.

Year 5

While some of us look back to our Crabbe trip last week with fond pining, 5F were lucky enough to go most recently. The weather wasn't always perfect, but we think when the trips were organised a while ago, we expected a tempestuous October, so the children are very lucky indeed! Please see our Facebook page for the updates for all classes, including the most recent ones from 5F who returned exhausted, but happy, on Wednesday morning.

We were glad to welcome you into our classrooms on Thursday. The children LOVED creating tests for parents to do! They really wanted to make it tricky so we hope you don't mind if any questions were challenging, but we hope you appreciate the children's methodology for solving various problems and the testament to their knowledge that they were able to curate a test for someone else which they themselves can master. This should provide a glimpse of what the children undergo each week, and how we would support them in class. If your child had demonstrated a good method for solving a

problem, please do encourage them to continue this at home with their own arithmetic home learning. Though we also acknowledge that there are plenty of other methods which are known, which if you find helpful you should continue to use at home.

We've closed the pages on *Oliver Twist* and have now started *Street Child* – a story about Jim Jarvis who, when discovered by Dr Barnardo, influenced the eponymous *Barnardo's Children's Charity*. The children are really enjoying our Victorian's topic and are looking for any excuse to dive into their Queen Victoria scrapbooks which are looking phenomenal!

We swimmingly resumed swimming this week. It's been said before, but what a huge difference from last year! Last year we thought they were good, but this year we're seeing so much potential. Thanks again to all of our parent volunteers who help to get us there and back each week.

In Writing, we soon shall be moving on to **parentheses**. Please explore this concept with children, that clauses can be separated by commas (or brackets) - sometimes even dashes! Parentheses are used to **expand** writing and **add** to it. If we think about the sentence *Jim Jarvis is considered the influence for Barnardo's Children's Charity* then we can expand this in the following ways:

- Jim Jarvis, a Victorian street child, is considered the influence for Barnardo's Children's Charity.
- Jim Jarvis an orphan from the Victorian era is considered the influence for Barnardo's Children's Charity.
- Jim Jarvis (who escaped a life of turmoil) is considered the influence for Barnardo's Children's Charity.

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Year 6

In Year 6 this week, the children have had their final kickboxing session of the half term, these will continue after half term for the first few weeks. The children have also been diving deeper into their emotions poetry writing. Coming up with some brilliant examples of personification and they have begun drafting poems about an emotion of their choice. We have continued to read more of our class text, 'Secrets of Platform 13', and the children

have been doing a brilliant job answering a range of questions on what they have read. In Maths, the children have begun their topic of multiplying and dividing 4-digit numbers and we welcomed in some parents to experience an arithmetic session where the children had created their own arithmetic questions and were testing their parents. They have also been painting their creatures they created out of clay last week, which had adapted to live in a desert or arctic environment.
